King Neptune

Love of the sea once prompted James Pearce Sadler to abandon the pursuit of a career in aeronautical engineering to become a cadet in the merchant marine, to sail 18 trips across the North Atlantic. He now returns to the sea, hypothetically speaking, in his reign over the First Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival as King Neptune L.

It wasn't the little known fact that he once sailed the seas, however, that won for Jim Sadler the distinction of serving as Virginia Beach's first monarch. It was a life of dedication to the business, civic and cultural development of this city that placed the coveted crown upon his head.



The selection of King Neptune I was a massive undertaking for it involved seeking out just one man in Virginia Beach most deserving of the honor because of his business and civic activities, a man who gives to the community by giving of himself. Hundreds of nominations were received after the Chamber of Commerce sent out ballots to its more than 950 members and the choice was gradually narrowed down to 10, then, finally, to one. Jim Sadler was the man and this selection probably came as no surprise to anyone but him since he is by nature a modest person who works without thought of recognition. The work is there to do. And he does it.

It was for just these reasons that he won another of the city's highest honors in 1971 when he was named First Citizen by the Virginia Beach Jaycees. That honor, too, was determined by letters of nomination and one in particular summarized the man when it said: "Each task to which he has committed himself has been for the attainment of a worthwhile community objective, either for Virginia Beach's economic growth or for the well being of its citizens. He has habitually met or exceeded the objective or goal for each endeavor in which he has participated. He only has demonstrated outstanding foresight in anticipating community needs but has worked unstintingly in fulfilling them."

The business life of Jim Sadler is the study of a self-made man who launched his way to success at age 13 as a waterboy in the field for his father, a bridge contractor. After leaving the merchant marine he joined a construction firm, was involved in building some of the area'smajor highways, became a seller of concrete and eventually helped organize Southern Materials Co., Inc. He retired in 1960 as that company's senior vice president and branched out in numerous fields... a golf course, two bowling alleys, a sports fishing fleet, real estate, hardware, broadcasting, and others. But retirement, despite his diversified business involvements, wasn't what it was cut out to be for Jim so in 1964 he formed his own business, Sadler Materials Corp. of which he is still president. With no immediate thoughts of a second retirement. In addition he is board chairman of Beach Cablevision Corp; president of Friend Sand & Gravel Co., Inc. in Petersburg; and director of First Virginia Bank of Tidewater.

His business expertise has been invaluable to the City of Virginia Beach as it has struggled through the early years of growth following the merger with Princess Anne County. He chaired the Mayor's Airport Study Committee, served six years on the Virginia Beach Industrial Authority and in many other ways has worked behind the scenes for progressive development.

As for his civic contributions, the list is almost endless: Cancer Chairman, Chamber of Commerce director and past president, director of the Virginia Beach Beautification Committee, General Hospital of Virginia Beach and Virginia Beach Service Center; honorary director of the Cancer Society and Kidney Foundation; Virginia Beach chairman for Friends of Virginia Wesleyan College and a member of the college's President's Advisory Council; just to mention a few.

Jim and his wife, Suzan, have long been supporters of charitable organizations and have frequently opened their Great Neck Point home for fund-raising socials of the Tennis Patrons, Kings Daughters and other worthwhile groups.

It is impossible to capsulize the contributions of Jim Sadler, for no job is too large. Or too small. He is a king in his own right and a most deserving King Neptune I.

History

As with all great happenings in history, the Vinginia Beach Neptune Festival started as a fleeting thought in the mind of one man.

GREERRERRERRERRER

It was Richard H. Kline, the 1973 president of the Virginia Beach Chamber of Commerce, who nourished the idea of an event that would pull the city together. A city that had been struggling to gain an identity ever since its merger with Princess Anne County ten years earlier.

Realizing that the city and Chamber of Commerce would have to work hand-in-hand to produce a unifying activity, Kline tried out his idea on Assistant City Manager George L. Hanbury. From this first brainstorming session came the idea of a seafood festival.

Armed with only one criterion, that the festival be one in which every citizen could participate, Kline and Hanbury then shared their idea with representatives of some 40 civic groups. Plans began to snowball and the seafood festival evolved into a 10-day extravaganza that would herald the many attributes of Virginia Beach: the ocean, industry, agriculture, civic involvement, sports and culture.

It was about this time that Tom Matthews of the Matthews Agency, a Virginia Beach advertising and public relations firm, became involved. He and his staff came up with the name "Neptune" and by researching other festival groups across the country, devised a workable plan.

To get the ball rolling, Frederick J. Napolitano, an executive with the Terry Corporation of Virginia, agreed to serve as Festival Chairman. The city then appropriated \$15,000 as "seed money," the Chamber chipped in \$4,000 and numerous civic and service clubs donated man-hours in developing the Festival.

Another giant step was taken when Napolitano appointed Mrs. Frankie Abourjilie, executive director, and she took over the complicated and highly technical business of planning and executing a festival. She was helped, too, when the city joined the International Festival Association and hired a festival consultant to study the proposed plans.

A lot of hard work has gone by the way since those early days of organization, but there's not a person who has given of himself that doubts the merit of his efforts. For what has grown through the months is a full-fledged festival that will, indeed, unify the City of Virginia Beach and make its citizens proud.



Napolitano summed it up when he said: "One day, not too many years down the road, the Neptune Festival will rival the Mardi Gras or the Sugar Bowl, or both, as a time to have fun and as a point of pride for all Virginia Beach residents. This first festival is a building block to that objective."


The first of any event is an exciting happening for it is from this point that future events will be molded, developing and growing through the years, but always influenced by that first historic occasion.

Many years from now, when the Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival equals or surpasses the New Orleans Mardi Gras — which officials fully believe it will — the Festival committee will surely be awed by the die-hard spirit of those who pioneered the event 'way back in 1974.'

Maybe they'll even say a little silent prayer of thanks for those before them who made all the mistakes and learned much in the process, for the untold hours of study and research in finding out exactly how you operate a gigantic undertaking like a Neptune Festival, for learning it all by trial and error and leaving a legacy of know-how.

Some names will be deeply etched in the annals of Festival history, and they will surely deserve every word of credit given them, but hopefully historians will also give due credit to the hundreds of nameless workers who actually made the 1974 event possible. And, again hopefully, historians will always note that the First Virginia Beach Neptune Festival was conceived as a festival for the people of this city, and it was nourished through its infancy by the dedication of the citizens of Virginia Beach.

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members of the King's Court. Applicants were required to be residents of the city during the 1974-75 school year, maintain at least a "C" scholastic average and plan to continue their education after school. They were also required to submit a head-and-shoulders photograph and two written paragraphs on why they wanted to serve on the Court.

Selecting the princesses was, of course, no easy task. And the responsibility for this difficult job fell to co-chaitmen William H. Wood, dean of students at Virginia Wesleyan College and Dr. Emest T. Buchanan, III, dean of students at Tidewater Community College. On their committee were Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court Judge Frederic P. Aucamp; State Senator A. Joseph Canada; Attorney J. Hugo Madison; Lynn Fischer, public relations director for Baldwin and Gregg, an engineering firm; and Vicky Randall, owner of John Robert Powers Modeling and Finishing School.

From the large group of applications received from all the city's high schools, plus one private school, the committee narrowed the list down to 19. These finalists were personally interviewed and the seven princesses were selected.



SHIRLEY S. BARONDESS


Board of Directors Religious Coordinator

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
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ALBIN R. MAILHES

Board of Directors



FOUR PARADES HIGHLIGHT FESTIVAL FUN

What really makes a festival? Why, a parade, of course . . . marching bands, colorful floats, funny clowns, booming drums, squealing children and happy faces . . . THAT'S what makes a festival!

And if one parade is that great, then four should be just about paradise for festival-lovers. That's the way the Virginia Beach Neptune Festival Committee looked at it so they lined up a parade to suit everyone's taste. Even one that floats.

KING'S ROYAL ARMADA

Getting the Neptune Festival off to a grand start will be the arrival of King Neptune and his Court Friday, September 27, at 7:45 p.m. In keeping with the King's nautical status, he will arrive by sea, aboard his own specially decorated barge, surrounded by his own colorful armada.

The King's Royal Armada will be comprised of pleasure boats whose owners have decorated them with all the flourish befitting such honored craft. The Royal Barge will be an amphibious Army LARC.

For their decorating efforts the armada captains will be competing for the coveted King's Cup Trophy, plus two small cash awards.

The Armada will gather at Rudee Inlet, sail up the shoreline and lay offshore as the King's barge slips up on the beach at the Steel Pier and takes the place of honor in the Community Torchlight Parade.

COMMUNITY TORCHLIGHT PARADE

While King Neptune and his Court of seven lovely princesses are making their grand entrance, hundreds of young people will be gathering near the pier for the Community Torchlight Parade, a marching band competition for junior high schools.

The King and Princesses, aboard the Royal Barge, will lead off the parade, about 8 p.m., up Atlantic Avenue. It will proceed to Laskin Road (31st Street) and will head west across Pacific Avenue where it will disperse.

Although the event is a band competition, there will be floats and guest bands featured. Illuminated floats will, in fact, furnish much of the lighting since the torchlights have been eliminated for obvious safety reasons. Street lights will do their share, too.

Three major awards will be presented in the competitions: the Royal Court Trophy, the Mayor's Trophy and King Neptune's Trophy. Participation trophies will be presented to all bands that qualify, if they do not receive a placement trophy.

In addition to the competing bands, guest bands and float units, the parade will also be made up of civic and cultural organizations marching in groups. A cash participation award will be presented to the largest group.

Judges for the Community Torchlight Parade competitions will be James Page, director of the Indian River High School Band, Norfolk; Emery L. Fears, Jr., band director, Norfolk State College, Norfolk; Martin Pachey, band director, Old Dominion University, Norfolk; and MUCS Alberto Asercion, School of Music, U.S. Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Virginia Beach.

Running simultaneously with this parade will be dancing in the streets and a seafood feast along the boardwalk between 10th and 17th Streets.

YOUTH DAY PARADE

One of the most exciting highlights of the First Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival will be Youth Day on October 4, a day-long extravaganza of events for kids of all ages.

And getting this special day off to an appropriate start will be a gala Youth Day Parade comprised exclusively of youngsrers between the ages of 6 and 14. It will begin at 9 a.m. at Windsor Woods Elementary School and wind its way to Mount Trashmore Park by way of Presidential Boulevard, to Historyland Trail to South Boulevard. Grand Marshal of the parade will be Miss Conrile Hindmarsh of television's "Connie's Magic Cottage." Special guests will be Busch Gardens' Friendly Eagle (a 200-pound lovable grant), and those very favorite characters from Lion Country Safari: Fried Flintstone, Barney Rubble, Scooby-Doo and Yog Bear.

Plus there will be clowns, the Alanton Twirlettes and the special floats of Little Miss Neptune and Little Miss Virginia Beach

Special certificates will be awarded to the best costumed participant, costumed pet, one-man band, decorated child-powered go-cart, decorated bicycle, musical group, youth club or organization and child-powered float. In this last category the floats will be limited in size to 2 x 3 feet.

Twenty-five of the young participants will be selected for special certificates and will receive McDonald's Restaurant's Citt Certificates. The event is sponsored by the Virginia Beach Youth Advisory Council, which is comprised of all the local youth groups... Cirl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Big Brothers, Mayor's Youth Council, Camp Fire Girls, Red Cross, the City Department of Parks and Recreation and the Virginia Beach Public Libraries.

Immediately following the parade a milk carton boat derby will be held at Lake Trashmore and a fourhour Youth Fair will get underway at the park.

GRAND CORONATION DAY PARADE SPECTACULAR

The real parade spectacular of the First Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival will be the Grand Coronation Day Parade to be held Saturday, October 5.

It will begin promptly at 9 a.m. at Princess Anne High School, moving west on Virginia Beach.
Boulevard to Dorset Avenue. The official reviewing stand will be located at Pembroke Mall.

The parade, of course, honors King Neptune I and his Court so as theme for the float entries will be. "Man and the Sea."

More than 80 units -- possible near 100 units -- will participate in this parade, including more than 25 marching bands, at least five military bands and many elaborately decorated floats.

Judging will be held in the Virginia State Senior High School Marching Bands Championship competition, the Military Marching Bands Championship competition and the Special Guest Units Awards competition. Guest units and Military units will be judged during the parade while the school units must compete in their respective divisions in both the Coronation Day Parade and at the Field Show to be held at 2-30 p.m. at the Cox High School Stadium. All awards will be presented following the Field Show.

Participation trophies will be given to all bands that qualify, if they do not receive a placement trophy. There will be three major trophy awards in the Virginia State High School Marching Bands Championship competition, plus first and second place trophies for Honor Class (schools Under 1,500 students, playing Grade 5 or under) and Championship Class (schools over 1,500 students, playing Grades 5 and 6). There will also be major awards for the winning bands in the Military and Special Guest Units divisions.

Judges for the band competitions will be Band Directors John Savage, Virginia Commonwealth University, Richmond; Martin Pachey, Old Dominion University, Norfolk, Lt. Col. Hal Gibson, U.S. Armed Fonces Bicentennial Band, Rt. George Meade, Md.; and W. W. Jacobus of Forest City, N.C., president of the All-American Drum and Busie Corps and Band Association.

Winning floats will be selected in the parade assembly area prior to the Coronation Day event but judges have encouraged float entries to also appear in the Community Torchlight Parade on opening night for extra exposure.

Awards will include. Festival Director's Trophy for the best commercial-retail entry; the Mayor's Trophy for the best civic or association entry; the Royal Trident Award for the most original interpretation of the theme "Man and the Sea," and a judges' Award for the float entry which has not taken one of the other awards but one which the judges seel has special ment.


Judging the floats will be two well-known Tidewater artists, Barclay Sheaks, chairman of the Art Department at Virginia Wesleyan University and Vance Mitchell, whose paintings have won more than 100 national and regional awards.

Additional judges for both the band and float competitions may be announced prior to parade time.











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Cultural events will play a very prominent part in the First Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival with varied programs scheduled throughout the 10 days.

A Memorial Concert will be presented Saturday, September 28, at 10 a.m. by the U.S. Naval Academy Band at the site of the Norwegian Lady Statue at 25th Street and Oceanfront. Also participating in the program, which is being sponsored by the Ladies Auxiliary to the Virginia Beach Borough Fire Department, will be Norwegian Ambassador Soren Sommerfelt, Second District Congressman G. William Whitehurst. and Norwegian Consul Rolf Williams.

An afternoon of music and pageantry will be the offering of a Concert-in-the-Park to be held at Red Wing Park Sunday, October 6, starting at 1 p.m. It will feature the Marine Corps Flag Pageant, the West Virginia University of Technology, the 3rd U.S. Infantry (Old Guard) Fife and Drum Corps, the Commander-in-Chief's Guard, Madison College, Langley Air Force Band and the Desperado Debs.

That same day, the final day of the Festival, the Virginia Beach Civic Ballet will perform at Princess Anne High School at 3 p.m. Another ballet program will be presented earlier, on October 1 at 8 p.m., at Princess Anne High School by the Virginia Beach Community Ballet.

Two other musical programs are also planned. On September 29 at 3 p.m. the Virginia Beach Civic Symphony and Virginia Beach Civic Chorus will present a joint concert on the terrace of the Hofheimer Library at Virginia Wesleyan College and on October 3 at 8 p.m. the Civic Chorus will present its own "Fanfare for a Festival" at Princess Anne High School.

A varied art schedule will also highlight the 10-day event. The Arts Center will sporsor the Virginia Museum's Artmobile exhibit of Melanesian art, entitled "Symbols of Myth." September 30 through October 3 daily from 1 to 8 p.m. at the Civic Center. In connection with this exhibit the Arts Center will present a lecture by Edward Cutler of Washington, D.C. September 30 at 8 p.m. at the Civic Center.

At the Arts Center Gallery throughout the run of the Festival there will be on exhibit 14 wood engravings by Winslow Homer, entitled "Homer by the Sea", on loan from the Virginia Museum Collection; a one-artist show of pastels and oils by Floyd E. Sykes, and the best-in-show winners from the Center's popular Boardwalk Art Show, dating back to 1968.

A Youth Art Show, under sponsorship of Sir Galahad Corp., will be held September 28-29 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the Boardwalk between 10th and 20th Streets. It will include the works of school-age youngsters, including students of Vo-Tech School and Tidewater Community College. It will be judged for cash awards and ribbons.

Artists will also compete for cash awards in the First Annual Hilltop North Art Show at the shopping center September 26-28 from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on the first two days and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the final day.

Festival Flower



If Virginia Beach seems to be alive with lovely yellow chrysanthemums during the ten days of the First Neptune Festival, September 27-October 6, it's with good reason.

The mum was selected as the official Festival Flower and a concentrated drive has been on to get as many of the plants in bloom as possible in time for the big event.

The reasoning behind the mum project was to bring more color to Virginia Beach during the Neptune Festival. Late September to early October is the time of year when the leaves have not yet turned red and gold and very few flowers are in bloom.

So to compensate for the lack of color, the Festival committee set about finding the perfect blooming plant. It was Landscape Architect Pat Bridges of the Norfolk Botanical Gardens who voted for the chrysanthemum, explaining to the committee that all you have to do is 'put them on the ground and sit on them and they'll grow!' And they're not expensive.

The Virginia Beach Council of Garden Clubs came on the scene and agreed to take over the sale of the official flower. In the spring they promoted flats of the tiny seedlings for those who prefer to 'grow from scratch,' so to speak. The Green Run Garden Club capped \$15 in prize money for selling the most flats.

Since September 10 the council has had the 15-inch plants, fully budded, on sale, and has been encouraging garden clubs all over the city to promote these plants in their neighborhoods since they supposedly will bloom forth the end of September.

To add a little incentive, the council will award another \$15 to the garden club that has used mums most effectively at its neighborhood entrance and silver bowls will go to the resident and commercial firm that most effectively has used mums.

These awards will be made by King Neptune on October 5 following his coronation at Mount Trashmore.




In addition to all their behind-the-scenes contributions, the various bases have also planned their own special events.



The horsey set will enjoy a charity horse show and a shodeo.



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Youth



Something for everyone. That's what the First Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival is all about.

And something for youngsters of all ages is what Youth Day is all about.

Friday, October 4, has been set aside just for the kids since Virginia Beach schools will be closed that day. All youth will be able to participate and enjoy the parade and fair and milk carton races and the many special events planned that day.

Activities get under way at Mount Trashmore Park at 9 a.m. with a rousing parade of colorful floats and energetic marchers. The paraders will be ages 6 to 14 and Connie Hindmarsh of television's Connie's Magic Cottage will lead them as grand marshal.

Immediately following the parade, Lake Trashmore will come alive with strange-looking craft made of milk cartons as youngsters from 9 years of age and up compete in the Milk Carton Boat Derby.

The Neptune Youth Fair which opens at 11 a.m. will be four fun-filled hours of contests, shows, special guests, clowns and gaily decorated booths selling everything from hot dogs to popcom and homemade goodies.

The fair will get off to a tasty start with an ice cream eating contest in which 15 contestants from different youth groups will compete.

Then the fair will "go to the birds" at noon when the Kings Dominion-Lion Country Safari birds put on one of the craziest shows to hit this area in a long time.

Also on hand from Lion Country Safari will be some special guests: Fred Flintstone, Barney Rubble, Scooby-Doo and Yogi Bear, characters from the new entertainment complex.

For the young daredevils there will be an exciting tricycle race at 1 p.m. with the participants competing for the prize of prizes, the Neptune Trike Cup, the highest honor in the fast world of tricycles. There will be qualifying races in four age groups — 5 to 7, 8 to 10, 11 to 12, and 13 and over.

Rounding out the special events will be a marionette show at 2 p.m.

Close to 100 entries from a nine-state area are expected at the Soap Box Derby Rally, Saturday, October 5 at Mount Trashmore. Special guest will be Curtis L. Yarborough of Elk Grove, California, the 1974 National Soap Box Derby winner.

Maintaining the aquatic flavor of the Festival, youngsters as well as adults will try their skill at a marathon swim-a-long in the New Cavalier Hotel pool to raise money for a variety of YWCA youth activities. The two-day event takes place October 4 and 5. Swimmers will earn money for the "Y's" charitable activities by asking parents and neighbors to pledge money for each length of the pool they swim.

For thrills and excitement, Young Life of Virginia Beach promises to present an event demonstrating physical prowess. High school students who belong to the non-denominational church group will launch between 8 and 10.7-man life rafts in a race along the oceanfront on Saturday, September 28.

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

Funding

When you're talking about an event as exciting and colorful as the Neptune Festival a word like 'funding' seems to strip away some of the glamour.

But it's necessary. Even more necessary than the abundance of enthusiasm and hard work and personal interest that brought the Festival into focus in the first place. And those who have planned and executed the event will be quick to tell you that if it hadn't been for the funding, the First Annual Virginia Beach Neptune Festival would never have been.

The city kicked it off with a \$15,000 grant. The appropriation was made with somewhat of a 'let's-seewhat-you-do-with-it' attitude, and once the council and administration saw the citizenry response to the project they backed up the Festival committee with all the manpower, facilities and services at their

Then the Chamber of Commerce chipped in \$4,000 and a nest egg was established.

Guardian angel is hardly the phrase for a robust man like Horace A. Cistola, but that's just about what he was to the Festival committee when he agreed to handle the funding.

Cistola, senior vice president for Terry Corporation, set a goal of \$86,000 and immediately lined up a group of civic-minded people he knew to be capable of helping him meet this challenge.

All of the business firms and retail stores were categorized according to type of business and each was approached for financial assistance for the Festival.

The local innkeepers, representative of the city's major industry, tourism, were the first to come through, with over \$17,000.

Inspired by this response, other businesses followed suit and the Festival was on its way.

In gratitude for the large donations, the Festival committee established the Seahorse Club, an exclusive organization comprised of those firms or individuals who contributed \$1,000 and over.

It was these people who gave the money needed by the Festival officials for operating capital. "Without them we could not have had the Festival," said Mrs. Frankie Abourjilie, executive director.
